'I like Seal Island because it shows how much fun you can have without your parents' – Laura


'I like the book because Grace gets to stay on the island with her granny and gets to find seals' – **Dylan**

Nursery Learning

Ladybird class are learning about **living and growing** this half term. This week, we have been reading the story of '**The Very Hungry Caterpillar**' by Eric Carle. It's a childhood classic, which generation after generation have loved. Through the story, the children have been learning about healthy eating and the life-cycle of a butterfly.

Evie 'He eat too much fruit and got a tummy ache, then he was a butterfly.'

Timia-Raine 'He turns into a butterfly.'

Wilbur 'The caterpillar turns into a butterfly and the butterfly lays an egg and he turns into a caterpillar and a cocoon.'

This week in their books, the children have been drawing the stages of the life-cycle of a butterfly. We are really proud of them; look how well they have drawn, made marks and written.

We have been counting fruits into the caterpillars mouth in **math** and made a fruit salad as part of our personal, social and emotional development. We talked about our favourite fruit.

Following on from storytime, **Dorothea** drew her own story map of **Charlie and the Chocolate.**




