Please make sure that your children come to school everyday and on time! If you are late, please report to the school office to get a mark on the register. Children coming in late disturbs the learning of the whole class.




Goodrich Rocks T-Shirt Design Winner!

Year 4 Book of the Week


Class 14 have really been enjoying the Horrible Histories books.


As it says in the blurb "It's history with the nasty bits left in!"

out more. The best thing about these books is that you learn about History without even realizing that you are learning!






Class 13 would like to recommend Enid Blyton's 'First Term at Malory Towers.'

The book was first published in 1946 and focuses on Darrell Rivers' adventures in her first term at a new school. Before the days of Harry Potter and Hogwarts, Malory Towers was the original boarding school saga! Malory Towers is a castle-like clifftop boarding school in Cornwall. Determined to do well and make friends, Darrell's first term is turbulent. Her temper causes problems as she tries to make friends.

If you enjoy this book, there are a whole series of Malory Towers books to devour.

Year 6 Learning



Last week Year 6 took part in the national SATs exams, beginning with spelling, punctuation and grammar and finishing with Maths reasoning. Although the children were a little overwhelmed with the prospect of the week, this did not show. They have been extremely resilient and did themselves, parents, teachers and staff proud! They showed this by working tremendously hard before and during the tests and we know they will continue to do so throughout Year 6 and beyond.

"It seemed very difficult at first but as time went on, the difficulty of questions became easier." Israel.

"I did the best that I could and I am proud with what I achieved!" Finn & Rafaela.

Now that they have successfully completed the tests, they have shared their valuable advice to support the children who will be taking them next year.

"A piece of advice for the upcoming Year 6s: Go into SATs with a positive mindset and remember that you can only do your best." Ellie.

"Even though you think SATs is hard, it isn't! Don't stress and hold your head up." Lilly.

"My advice for next year's Year 6 classes is to stay calm and not overcomplicate all the equations in your head. Also, make sure you read the question twice and carefully. If you're struggling, don't hesitate to ask a teacher for help." **Lara**

"My advice would be not to overthink it as most of the questions you can do. Always make sure you've read the question properly and underlined all the key vocabulary. Also, make sure you go to breakfast so you can have a healthy start to the day and a good time with your friends." **Frankie**

"My advice is not to be scared of the SATs because they're actually easier than you think, and they're just like the regular assessments we do anyway. When you're doing them, don't overthink the questions because you will be able to do most of them!" **Raff**

"My advice to Year 5s would be not to worry about the tests because they're not as hard as you think, and the assessment weeks prepare you for the tests. Another thing that you should do to help you is learn your times tables." **Charlotte**

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
