Year 6 Book of the Week


A Kind of Spark by Elle Mcnicoll





Year 4 Learning



This term in science, Year 4 have been studying the digestive system.

Class 13 have been working scientifically; experimenting on how different liquids affect our teeth. Parents will be glad to hear we have not been using the children's actual teeth in the name of science, preferring to use egg shells as they also contain calcium!

We left egg shells in a variety of liquids for 7 days and then observed the results.

We saw that vinegar and coke changed the egg shells considerably due to the high levels of acid and sugar. We concluded that drinks with high levels of acid and sugar are more likely to damage our teeth. The results

have led the children to consider their future choice of bever-

"There are so many different symbols for words and letters that it was fascinating to learn about the way that the Egyptians recorded their writing." **Sophie**








In **class 13** Maths sessions this week, the children have been learning how to calculate area of rectilinear shapes.

Attendance Matters




Guidelines for Pupil Absence (our Attendance Policy is available from the school website)

- ◆ If your child is going to be absent we ask that you notify the school office by 8:30am each day of absence. You must <u>call</u> each day that your child is absent. This is because there are procedures to record absences after each call.
- Please provide the school with documentary evidence of any medical appointments attended by your child and copies of any medicines prescribed. These will enable your child's absence to be authorised.
- We would also like to be kept informed if a pupil has any ongoing health concerns that may
 affect their attendance. In some cases, we may ask you to attend an appointment with the
 School Nurse.
- ◆ Absence Request forms should be completed prior to dates requested. Please note, completion of this form does not mean automatic authorisation.

If your child's attendance is under 90%, any further absences are likely to be marked as unauthorised until the attendance rises to above 90%, even if an absence is requested.

Whooping cough	Violent coughing, over and over, until child inhales with "whooping" sound to get air into lungs		G.P.	Back to school after 5 days of antibiotics or 21 days from onset of illness
