Reception class 21 have enjoyed reading 'Caterpillar and Bean' by Martin Jenkins.


'I like it when the butterfly was coming out'-Raven

Class 20 have really enjoyed reading 'Oops!' says Ollie Bear by Tony Kenyon.


A story about a very naughty bear who helps himself to chocolate cake!

Martha "I like the bit at the end when the bear is asleep and you don't know that he took the chocolate cake"




Class 22 recommend 'The Pencil' by Allan Ahlberg, a story about a playful pencil that drew a rubber that turned out to be rather cheeky!

Year 5 Learning

Class 19, Year 5 Science

Investigating Friction (SCIENCE FRICTION!)


Our last few experiments have been studying FRIC-TION!

During these tests of different surfaces and friction levels we have learnt all of the varieties of friction, this includes rolling friction, sliding friction, static friction and fluid friction.

Rolling , sliding and static friction occur between two solids, for example trainers on a sports pitch being sliding friction and car tyres on a tarmac road would be rolling friction.

In our experiments we used a Newton meter to pull a trainer along different surfaces around the school, testing the amount of force needed to move the trainer and the amount of friction and grip between the two surfac-

es. As we investigated, our results showed that the surface in the school which has the highest friction is the astroturf as it is used for Physical Education and quick sprinting where you would NOT want to be slipping over. On the other hand, the surface with the lowest friction was the metal benches by the office, this is because it is a smooth surface allowing the trainer to move quickly along its exterior.



FUN FACT
